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
Papal Visit

Religious Freedom Summit

On September 18, The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC, hosted a [Religious Freedom Summit](#), which was co-sponsored by the Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty (among many others). Archbishop Lori gave the opening keynote, which you can read here:

Religious Liberty as a Cornerstone of Human Dignity

My warmest thanks to all who have organized this summit on religious freedom in these days just prior to the visit of Pope Francis to the United States.

Speaking of Pope Francis, let me begin these reflections on religious liberty as a cornerstone of human dignity by mentioning a few of his quotes, so as to set the stage for our topic. The first sounds like a dire warning: "When, in the name of an ideology, there is an attempt to remove God from society, it ends up adoring idols, and very soon men and women lose their way, their dignity is trampled and their rights violated" (September 23, 2014). The following two quotes are exhortations: "Religious freedom is not only that of private thought or worship. It is the liberty to live, both privately and publicly, according to the ethical principles resulting from found truth" (June 20, 2014). And again: "We must promote religious liberty for all people. Every man and woman

must be free to profess his or her faith, whatever it might be. Why? Because that man and that woman are children of God" (May 20, 2013).

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Non datur libertas sine veritate.
